
We Celebrate Holy Week

SUNDAY GOSPEL

Palm/Passion Sunday

Matthew 26:14—27:66

During Holy Week, we celebrate the final days of Jesus’ life on earth. On Palm/Passion Sunday, we read Matthew’s story of Jesus’ trial, suffering, Crucifixion, and Death. This lesson also includes John’s Gospel story of Jesus’ final days (see pages 5–8), so your teacher may choose to assign reading the Sunday Gospel as homework.



Connecting GOSPEL and DOCTRINE

This week, we walk with Jesus through the Paschal Mystery of his suffering, Crucifixion, Death, and Resurrection. We are saved out of God’s love for us. “He loved us and sent his son to be the expiation for our sins” (1 John 4:10). This means that Jesus makes things right through

his Death. Jesus dies so that our sins are forgiven—even the Original Sin that we inherited from our first ancestors. Jesus is called a suffering servant (CCC, 623). This means that Jesus humbly accepts and follows God’s plan for his life, knowing that it will end in his death.

We pray the Stations of the Cross throughout Lent and especially during Holy Week. The fourteen stations begin with Jesus being condemned to death on the Cross and end with him being laid in his tomb. Turn to page 57 in *What the Church Believes and Teaches* to follow the events of Jesus’ suffering and Death. Compare these stations with those in the *My Good Friday Stations of the Cross* booklet on pages 5–8 in the lesson.



Jesus Washes His Friends' Feet

When John tells the story of Jesus' Last Supper with his friends, he never mentions Jesus' blessing and sharing bread and wine the way the other Gospel writers do. Instead, John tells how Jesus washed the feet of his friends, a job usually done by servants. The Church remembers Jesus' example at Mass on Holy Thursday by reading the story and washing feet. What can we do for one another today that is like washing people's feet in Jesus' time?

Jesus Celebrates the Last Supper with His Friends

Celebrate this Last Supper prayer service based on the Gospel Reading for the Evening Mass on Holy Thursday, John 13:1–15.

Leader: Jesus Christ is our teacher and Savior.

All: As Jesus did, so we must do.

Narrator: This is the story of how Jesus washed his friends' feet. Jesus rose from the meal that he was eating with his friends and took off his cloak. He picked up a towel and tied it around himself.

John: What do you suppose Jesus is doing?

Narrator: Then Jesus poured water into a basin and began to wash his disciples' feet and dry them with the towel he had around him.

James: Washing people's feet is a job for servants. Why is Jesus doing a servant's work?

Narrator: Then Jesus came to wash the feet of Simon Peter.

Peter: Are you going to wash my feet?

Jesus: You may not realize now what I am doing, but later you will understand.


Peter: You shall never wash my feet!

Jesus: If I do not wash you, you will have no share in my heritage.

Peter: Then wash my feet, and my hands and head as well.

Narrator: After Jesus had washed their feet, he put his cloak back on and reclined at the table once more.

Jesus: Do you understand what I just did for you? You call me "teacher" and "Savior," which is fitting. But if I washed your feet—I, who am teacher and



Savior—then you must wash each other's feet. What I just did was to give you an example: as I have done, so you must do.

Leader: Let us tell about the people we know who teach us how to follow Jesus today.

Each person takes a turn telling about a person who should receive a Great Christian Service Award.

Leader: Jesus showed us that serving one another is giving life to one another.

All: We can love and serve. We can give others new life.



Help us to let go of grudges and to forgive people who hurt us.




4. Jesus Meets His Mother

you will come again.**




5. Simon Helps Jesus Carry His Cross

Help us to see you in each person we meet.




10. The Guards Strip Jesus of His Clothing


We are your friends and followers, Jesus;

You fall again, Jesus, and wonder if you can make it to the top of the hill.


We remember your perseverance. Help us keep trying to be better people.

Veronica is brave, Jesus. When she offers you a towel, you leave the image of your face on it.


Give us Veronica's courage to help a classmate when no one else will.

Make us loyal friends to the people we know.




12. Jesus Dies on the Cross

Help us to realize that death is part of life, when we will see you and our loved ones again.




7. Jesus Falls Again
